




ABOUT BALKAN SAYS 2021

The 2021 edition of Balkan SAYS will be an online conducted on the Zoom platform and hosted by the Euro-Atlantic Council of Slovenia in cooperation with the Faculty of Social Sciences, University of Ljubljana. There will be 42 participants in this year's Balkan SAYS who come 22 different countries and a variety of backgrounds. The targeted audience are students and young professionals under 35 years of age and come mostly from Europe, especially the Balkans. All of the participants will receive a short background briefing (included in the Annexe of this document) to give them a basic overview and knowledge base on the topics, as well as the key questions which the speakers will address during the panel discussions.

PANEL FORMAT

Number of speakers: 2-4 + 1 moderator

The panels will begin with the moderator introducing all the speakers for that panel. Each speaker will then make a 10–15-minute introductory presentation and once all the presentations are finished the panel will move to a moderated debate and Q&A session. Participants will write the questions into the online platform chat and the moderator will pick which questions to ask. The participants will be muted, and their video feeds disabled, to ensure smooth running of the conference. **The panels are scheduled to last for one and a half hours.**

The panels and workshops will be organised as a continuous Zoom meeting and the link will be sent to participants at least three days before the conference.

Speakers are asked to connect to the meeting at least **10 minutes prior** to the start of their panel to ensure that the connection is stable.

Speakers can give their presentation on any aspect of the topic of the panel and do not have to directly answer the questions. The questions are deliberately broad and should merely serve as guidelines when preparing for their presentation. There will be opportunities to develop your thoughts during the Q&A.

WORKSHOP FORMAT

Participants will be divided into smaller groups of around 10 people and assigned into breakout rooms. Each room will also have a moderator who will guide the discussions and record any



conclusions. The workshops will allow each participant to discuss their arguments and what has been said during the panel presentations with their peers. At the end of each workshop the participants will have to agree on a set of policy recommendations for the given topic.

Workshops will take place after the first and second panel discussions of the first day of the seminar (15 September).
